

## EVER-EVOLVING LEGACY OF SEMINARY GUILD

The Seminary Guild, in its present form, has been in existence for 92 years. What a wonderful legacy of service!

The purpose of the Seminary Guild has changed through the years, to fulfill what was most needed. In the 1800s, before the Seminary Guild existed in its more present form, Mrs. C.F.W. Walther's sewing circle, as it became known, engaged in activities such as mending socks, making bedding, towels, shirts and handkerchiefs for the students, and raising \$1,000 for guest room furnishings. In the 1860s, during povertyridden times, they would drive a wagon to nearby farms to gather produce for the Seminary kitchen with a young son of a faculty member.

In 1932, Mrs. Walther's sewing circle expanded its activities and became the Lutheran Woman's League of Greater St. Louis. One of their groups, the student welfare committee, had the following purpose: "Arouse a deeper interest in Concordia Seminary and its students by the women of the St. Louis area and its surrounding territories." One of its notable initiatives was the annual jelly shower, where the women from the area brought homemade jams and jellies to the Seminary dining room in November. Some women traveled a great distance by bus and train, covering more than 100 miles in some cases. This successful project was held for several years, with approximately 1,100 women responding annually and an average of 2,000 jars collected.

An interesting development occurred in 1941. The Lutheran Women's Missionary League (LWML) was formed, being divided into smaller divisions known as Synodical districts. What had been the student welfare committee became the student welfare committee of the LWML Western District. In the 1944 LWML convention, the group name changed again to the Concordia Seminary Guild of the LWML, St. Louis Zone, and would limit its work to Concordia Seminary, St. Louis.

Through the years, the Concordia Seminary Guild of the LWML contributed to various projects for the students, including Christmas boxes, establishing a health clinic, creating a recreation/lounge area in Wyneken Hall and providing bed linens and blankets. changing needs and transitioned from accepting jam and jelly donations to initiating specific cash projects each year and soliciting monetary donations. One of the earliest projects was providing \$100 for a student council retreat focusing on devotions and preparing for the upcoming school year.

In January 1955, the group became a separate entity and was named Concordia Seminary Guild. The tradition of monetary support of designated projects continues to this day.

At one time, a gift was presented to each graduating student from the Seminary Guild. Once, it was a framed picture of the Luther statue on campus. Then, the thought evolved into presenting a graduating class gift to the Seminary. Now, the focus has been to gift incoming students with journaling Bibles.

There have been several projects through the years. In 1966, \$2,000 was donated to purchase bell No. 16 for the Seminary's carillon. Beautiful furniture was also provided for the lounge in Loeber Hall. The women also maintained the altar linens in the chapel and purchased a piano for Koburg Hall. Additionally, equipment was provided for the Pederson Field House.

The tradition of supplying refreshments for graduation receptions started in the 1960s and continues today. In recent years, the Seminary has consistently supported four students annually through the Adopt-A-Student program.

Our project goal this year is to raise \$21,000 through donations. This will support, in addition to the journaling Bibles, Commencement reception and Adopt-A-Student projects already mentioned, the following projects:

- Music arts (mainly Laudamus)
- Chapel of the Holy Apostles' renovation
- Holy Land study abroad program
- Chapel listening technology



## FROM THE GUILD PRESIDENT

Each August, the Seminary Guild board has the opportunity to participate in the new student orientation. This year, plans are slightly different.

One of the Seminary Guild's projects in recent years was to provide financial support for the day that new students participate in a servant event. This opportunity will not take place this year. The Seminary Guild's financial support for that project has now been reallocated to support new listening technology in the Chapel of St. Timothy and St. Titus.

The project of providing a journaling Bible for each new student was a bit more personalized this year. Five Seminary Guild board members were present between morning chapel and the student's late morning meeting to distribute the Bibles and briefly chat with the new students. The Seminary Guild also was given time in an organized orientation meeting for new students to talk about the history of the Seminary Guild, its purpose and how it benefits Seminary students.

Due to cost accounting and food budgets, the Seminary could no longer accept jam and jelly donations in the early 1950s. The Concordia Seminary Guild of the LWML adapted to the
